

2023 Annual Ministry Report

All of the CAP year round programs have seen increases in demand for services in 2023. The Food Connection is currently providing 36 families each week with food boxes, with additional families on the waitlist. Our Clothing Bank use increased 20% over last year, with nearly 2000 items per month being claimed for reuse. A donation of safety vests to the Clothing Bank inspired us to provide them to clients that have a need to walk or bike at night. Our chaplains assisted many experiencing financial stress and health challenges.

CAP's three seasonal programs - the Winter Coat Drive/Distribution, Thanksgiving Baskets, and Community Toy Store – helped many local families this fall. Also, with the assistance of Monte's Just a Bite, we were able to provide a hot Thanksgiving meal to 15 of our local unhoused neighbors.

The CAP Board places a high priority on community education, partnering with The Whatcom Dream to provide Understanding Poverty workshops and Financial Empowerment classes throughout the year. We were especially excited about the Teen Financial Empowerment class held in the summer that was attended by 13 students. We plan to continue these classes in 2024.

CAP has been coordinating and hosting a monthly Community Outreach Network meeting. This brings together representatives from a dozen or more local organizations that serve lower income families, allowing us to learn about and support each other's work and find ways that we can more effectively serve our neighbors. Many positive connections and collaborations have resulted, including Bridge2Services bringing a mobile shower unit to Blaine once a week in the new year, providing a much-needed service for our unhoused neighbors. Also, Bridge2Services now has its outreach truck at each of the Loads of Love events at the local laundromat, providing additional support services for the increasing number of those that utilize this program.

Thanks to all of our faithful donors, our financial support was solid in 2023, making it possible for us to run all of our programs well. Several large, unexpected donations that were received will allow us to look for opportunities to help other underserved areas of the community.

None of what CAP does would be possible without our amazing volunteers and donors! CAP is a unique neighbor-helping-neighbor community effort, and we are so grateful for all of you that care about your neighbors through CAP!




